Professor dale

Professor Dale Pinto is currently Professor of Taxation Law and Academic Discipline Lead of Taxation in the Curtin Law School. He is also the Chair of the Academic Board and a member of the University Council at Curtin University and the elected Academic Representative for Curtin on the UniSuper Consultative Committee. He was appointed as the inaugural Chair of the Curtin Academy Advisory Board in 2020.

Dale is the author and co-author of numerous books, refereed articles and national and international conference papers and sits on the editorial board of several peer-reviewed journals as well as being the Editor-in-Chief of several refereed journals.

Dale is also a Fellow of the Australian Academy of Law as well as being a Fellow of CPA Australia, a Chartered Accountant, Chartered Tax Adviser and Honorary Life Member of the Tax Institute. He is also a Life Member of the Australasian Tax Teachers Association and the Australasian Law Academics Association

He is the immediate past Chair of the Tax Institute's National Education Quality Assurance Board (a position he held for 10 years). He is currently Chair of CPA Australia's Education, Policy and Innovation Committee (EPIC). He is a member of the Tertiary Education Quality and 251 heavy 54 February 55 (TEQSA) Register of Experts. Earlier in 2021, he was invited to be a member of the Strategic Advisory Council of the Australian Council of Professions.

Dale has extensive board experience including six years on a not-for-profit Board in the disability sector, three years on a regulatory Board (Tax Practitioners Board) and is currently a Director and Deputy President of CPA Australia which is one of the largest professional accounting bodies in the world with a global membership of over 168,000 members (as at 31 December 2020) in more than 100 countries around the world.

Professor harlene

Professor Harlene Hayne ONZM is Vice-Chancellor of Curtin University. Prior to commencing this role in April 2021, she had served as Vice-Chancellor of the University of Otago in New Zealand since 2011.

She is a Fellow of the Royal Society of New Zealand and of the Association for Psychological Science and in 2009 was awarded the New Zealand Order of Merit for services to scientific and medical research. In 2012 she received an Honorary Doctor of Science degree from Colorado College, USA, and in 2021 she received an Honorary Doctor of Laws from the University of Otago.

Professor Hayne is a former Chair of Universities New Zealand, Te Pōkai Tara, the peak body for the country's universities and of Fulbright New Zealand. She also chaired the Universities New Zealand Research Committee and has been a member of the Board of the New Zealand Treasury, of the Marsden Fund Council, and of the New Zealand National Science Panel.

Originally from the United States, Professor Hayne received a Bachelor of Arts from Colorado College, and a Master of Science and PhD in Behavioural Neuroscience from Rutgers University. She spent three years as a post-doctoral fellow at Princeton before joining the University of Otago in 1992. She subsequently served as Head of the Psychology Department and as Deputy Vice-Chancellor Research and Enterprise before being appointed as Vice-Chancellor in 2011.

Professor Hayne has published widely in the area of memory development and adolescent risk taking, and has supervised numerous PhD, master and undergraduate honours theses.

She is an Associate Editor of Psychological Science in the Public Interest and of Memory and is a member of the Editorial Board of Infant Behaviour and Development and of Developmental Psychobiology.

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
